Cornerstone of Adas Israel-Chevra Kaddishah Congregation

First Orthodox synagogue in Duluth, Minnesota

Memories by Hattie Kenner Goldish

“The second joyful ceremony took place on November 23, 1900 (*November 28, 1901*) when the laying of the cornerstone occurred. The street was crowded with men, women and children. Dignitaries of the city were there to welcome the new home of the first Orthodox Synagogue in Duluth.

Mr Shopsisie Karon had donated \$100 for the Shul for his father Yoseph Abba Karon to have the honor of placing the permanent steel box into the present cornerstone. This steel box contains the Legal drawn up Charter and By-laws of the Synagogue, coins by adults and children were put into this box with the year only of 1900 which whenever it were to ever be opened, the dates of the year would be found. The history of the beginning of their first place of worship from the First Room in the House to the moment of the date of the cornerstone. The charter members list was paced in this strong historical box and whatever papers of history for the following generations. In this box the registered name of the new permanent home of worship ‘The Adas Israel-Chevra Kaddishah Congregation’ name was placed.

Morris Klasky, then a young boy attended this ceremony of the laying of the cornerstone, and also, he marched with all the congregants from the Webster School place of worship, when they carried the Torahs and Holy Scriptures to the new Shul on the day they moved. Many speeches and prayers of Blessings were given at the laying of the cornerstone. One of the speakers was Mr. Robert Denfeld the then Superintendent of schools, and also the Mayor, Mr. Trulson (Truelsen) gave a speech. This really was a day for joy.

The final day of moving from the last rented place of worship, the Webster School came. Most of the Jewish congregants came to bid farewell to this last rented Shul to march to their new home, Adas Israel. The men carried the Torahs with everyone, men, women, and children marching from South First Ave. East to the new Adas Israel Synagogue. The march went along Lake Ave. South along Superior Street, up to the New Congregation. The doors of the Synagogue were opened and outside, the Cantor started to sing and chant as the Cantor and Rabbi let the men carrying the Torahs in a line of march into the Shul, with the entire crowd of people marching and praying and chanting. After the Torahs were placed in the Permanent Ark, the Cantor sang and chanted. The congregants took their seats. The Rabbi gave prayers and the very first prayer and services took place then, after many years of dreams not come true.

CEREMONY TO BE IMPRESSIVE

LAYING OF CORNER STONE OF NEW
 SYNAGOGUE OF ADAS ISRAEL
 CONGREGATION.

FOUR GENERATIONS PRESENT

MRS. ANNA COOK WILL BE SPECIAL-
 LY HONORED.

Her Children, Grandchildren and
 Great Grandchildren Will
 Take Part.

The ceremony of laying the corner
 stone of the new synagogue now in
 course of construction for the Adas
 Israel and Chivra Kadisha congrega-
 tion of the Orthodox Jews of Duluth,
 at Third avenue east and Third street,
 will take place Thanksgiving after-
 noon at 2:30 o'clock. It will be an in-
 teresting event in more respects than
 one. The building committee has de-
 cided upon the general plan of the ex-
 ercises, but there is considerable detail
 that has not yet been arranged.

To Mrs. Anna Cook, of this city, has
 been assigned the honor of laying the
 corner stone, and she will be assisted
 by her children, her grand, and great
 grandchildren. Mrs. Cook is eighty
 years of age. Her son, I. Abrahamson,
 of the Hub Clothing store, and the lat-
 ter's children, are included in the list
 of assistants. Four generations of the
 family will officiate at the ceremony.
 Mrs. Cook has donated \$100 to the syn-
 agogue fund, which was made up of
 small sums put aside by the children
 for the purpose during past years, it
 long having been the ambition of the
 Orthodox Jews of Duluth to own a
 synagogue, a permanent place of wor-
 ship, instead of using a rented hall.
 The past summer they had a fund suf-
 ficient to warrant going ahead with
 their plans. It will be a building of
 considerable credit to the houses of
 worship of this city.

The Adas Israel and Chivra Kadisha
 congregation is one of the pioneer re-
 ligious organizations of the city. It
 has been in existence here for more
 than eighteen years, and among its
 members are several well known pio-
 neer residents and business men of Du-
 luth.

One of the features of the exercises
 in connection with the laying of the
 corner stone will be that the ministers
 of the city will be invited to be pres-
 ent, and several will be requested to
 speak. Mayor Hugo will also be
 among those invited to be present and
 speak. A fine program of music is to
 be arranged.
