

THE SILVERMAN-MOSS WEDDING.

One of the largest weddings of the season was solemnized last evening at the Temple Kehilath Anshe Maarev, corner of Indiana avenue and Twenty-sixth street. The occasion had long been looked forward to with pleasure by many personal friends. The contracting parties were Miss Rebecca Lewis Silverman, daughter of Lazarus Silverman, and Mr. Leopold Moss, of this city. The church was densely crowded when the bridal party arrived.

The bridal party entered in the following order: Mr. Henry W. Hill, Master of Ceremonies; Emanuel Ullman and L. A. Herrman, ushers; Miss Lottie Levi and Mr. George Silverman, Miss Mollie Silverman and Mr. A. This bridal procession was one of the largest ever seen in Chicago, and made a handsome appearance. The bridesmaids took positions on the outer right-hand side of the chancel, the groomsmen standing on the outer left. The older members of the party occupied positions between the groomsmen and bridesmaids, the bride and groom standing in the center, beneath a monster floral arch, composed of evergreens, smilax, and calla lilies. Pendant was an elegant floral piece of red and white flowers, containing the initial letters M and H. Mr. C. Koelling played the Mendelssohn wedding march during the procession. The Rev. L. Adler performed the ceremony according to the rites of the orthodox Jewish church. The address was in English, but the prayers were in Hebrew. After the wine had been tasted by the bride and groom, and the benediction pronounced in Hebrew and translated into German, the bridal procession left the church and afforded curious eyes of a monster crowd much satisfaction.

THE BRIDAL TOILET

was handsome and elaborate. It was of brocaded satin, cut princess, with basque waist, and long, round train. It was trimmed with white satin, with pearl fringe and pearl beadings. A long veil and orange blossoms completed an elegant toilet. The bridesmaids were attired in white organdy, cut princess. Miss Gusta Morris was an exception; her toilet was of white brocaded satin, princess, long train, with elaborate trimmings and diamond ornaments.

A grand reception was held in the evening at the Palmer House, some 250 guests being present. Elegant and choice toilets were exhibited by many handsome ladies. John A. Hand's orchestra dispensed music, while the bride and groom were being congratulated. At 9 o'clock the company entered the large dining room, where a tempting supper was served. The menu, printed on white silk ribbons, contained all the delicacies of the season.

During the evening several hundred telegrams were read, coming from friends in Cincinnati, Omaha, San Francisco and other points. There were also cable dispatches of congratulation from the Ullman and Loewenstein families of Leipzig, and the Livingston, Sternberger and Seligman families of Frankfurt.

After speeches and toasts the company returned to the parlors and danced until the early morn.
