The building will be completed in a few days, when a large steam boiler and new and improved carpet cleaning machinery capable of renovating carpets without injuring the fabric or colors will be set into place and everything put in readiness for opening up and doing business about the middle of the month. The machinery is of the very latest patent. Smyrna and Turkish rugs will be cleaned by a new process which makes them look as good as new ones, and carpets will also be cleaned on the floor by the same process. The new works will be known as the West Side Steam Power Carpet Renovating Works. Later on it is the intention of Mr. Sattler to add to his carpet cleaning works machinery for the renovating and cleaning of leathers, and also for the manufacture of hair, moss and husk mattresses. He has established an agency at H. Henly's, corner of Concord and State streets, and will have agencies in different parts of the city on the other side of the river where orders can be left. What Mr. Sattler purposes to do is to give the people a chance to get good work done at a very moderate cost. His enterprise to say the least is commendable and he certainly deserves the entire patronage of the West Side as he is the only man in this line of business. Mr. Sattler will also keep in stock in the future as he has in the past the finest lines of ingrain, all wool, tapestry and brussels carpets, mats and oilcloths, together with a full line of wall paper, that can be found in the market. He is a pleasant gentleman to deal with and invariably gives satisfaction to his customers.
