THE GREAT JEWISH EXHIBITION—ACTIVELY ALL ALONG THE LINE.

The arrangements for the great Fair to be held next month, in Music Hall, for the benefit of the Cleveland Orphan Asylum, are rapidly progressing, and the reports received at headquarters from the sub-committees who have the matter of details in their hands are full of encouraging information.

The Commercial of last Sunday furnished an elaborate report of what had been done up to that time, and what was expected to be accomplished previous to the opening. We are enabled this morning, to publish additional facts, which have come to light during the past week. It will plainly appear that all the Hebrew organizations are alive to the requirements of the undertaking, and no doubt will prove equal to it.
