Henry Wellington and Henry A. Jones of New York arrived in Duluth last evening from Chicago. These gentlemen are connected with the proposed steel plant mentioned in these columns yesterday. They were brought here by W. C. Sherrill and after looking over the head of the lake they will look for Chicago tonight. Mr. Wellington was seen by a reporter. He said: "As you probably know, our concern was recently burned down in Findlay, O. We had the advantage of natural gas there and while natural gas is a splendid fuel, it did not do it for us. We wanted more than that. It is not only a fuel, but it is also a fuel for the steel industry. We need large quantities of coal and then there are other business interests connected with ours, and these cut some figure in our minds."

NOT YET SETTLED. The Difference of Opinion Between the D. & G. and the Union Depot Co., General Manager Carpenter, of the Duluth Iron Range, returned yesterday from St. Paul, where he was in consultation with officers of the Duluth Union Depot company. "We did not reach any understanding," said he, "as there are some unlooked for complications to consider. We do not wish to understand that the Union Depot company is endeavoring to be unfair. Not in the least. The fact is that they have put a great amount of money into a depot—one that is ahead of the Union Depot. They have expended there figures up their expenses, and in reckoning their probable income have distributed the revenue among the roads according to the number of coaches that run into the depot. Now we run a single car line and our proportion is very large. In fact it would take one month part of our revenue from our passenger business on our entire line. Our business is mainly on the Union Depot. The other receipts of some of the roads we run in effect would be more than eaten up. The question now simply hinges on whether the Union Depot company is endeavoring to refuse what we can afford to pay. If they do refuse then we shall stop our business. The Union Depot company is doing far more than to travel the benefit of the percentage that we now propose to pay. The Union Depot company are not to be blamed for not making that they would to a great extent be simply suicidal. That is the situation in a nutshell."
