THE EXPLOSION! Latest Reports of the Disaster.

ONLY FIVE WERE KILLED San Francisco and Oakland Severely Shaken.

People Rush from Their Homes in Terror—Buildings Racked and a Panic Ensues—The Shock Felt at a Distance of Sixty Miles.

OAKLAND, July 9.—[By the Associated Press.]—The most terrible explosion that ever occurred in this neighborhood took place this morning at the giant powder works, just west of Berkeley.

The first explosion was in the nitro-glycerine house, and blew the building out of the ground. Fire spread, and one by one the magazines began to explode.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 9.—[Later dispatches from the scene of the explosion show that early reports were greatly exaggerated so far as loss of life is concerned.]

At Union Hill, one hundred yards from the nitro-glycerine house, exploded this morning, there were forty-two whites employed, and beyond, around the winding road that leads to the magazines and boarding houses, were thirty Chinese laborers at work in the packing houses.

The San Francisco Chemical works, owned by Egbert Hudson and J. L. N. Shepherd, were almost completely destroyed, and the loss is not far from \$150,000.

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A window in Schollhaas' store on Eleventh street was forced out by the explosion. Similar mishaps occurred in many parts of town.

AT PETALUMA. The loudest report ever heard here came from the south this morning about 9:23 o'clock. Doors and windows were shaken heavily, and people, supposing it to be an earthquake, ran rapidly out of the buildings to the center of the street.

There is great damage in West Berkeley. Not a window is left in place, and several buildings are wrecked.

STRIKERS SHOT. BAKERSFIELD, Cal., July 9.—[By the Associated Press.]—Two trainmen, Ed Benson and Geo. Rogers, said to be the leaders of the strikers of the Southern Pacific trainmen, were shot this morning just as a passenger train was leaving the yard for San Francisco, by a non-union man named Ackley, who goes by the name of Judge Ackley. It appears Ackley did not go out with the strikers, and they have threatened vengeance on him ever since.

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AT THE WORKS! The Workmen at Carnegie's Mills STILL KEEPING GUARD

Chicago Men Offering Financial Assistance.

Terrible Fire in New Foundland—The City of St. Johns Laid in Ashes—The Loss Placed at Over \$200,000,000, and the Fire Still Raging.

PITTSBURG, July 9.—[By the Associated Press.]—The committee from Homestead which had a conference with Governor Fairbank at Harrisburg last night returned this morning. Members, while saying they are not at liberty to report the results of the conference in detail, express themselves as thoroughly satisfied with the results of their mission.

There is a more pacific feeling towards the authorities this morning, and at a meeting today the sheriff may be asked to take charge of the works. This, however, will not prevent resistance in case new men are sent as determined in that direction as ever.

Much excitement was created in McKeesport this morning when a detachment of Homestead guards passed through, armed with Winchester rifles, in the direction of Keyport. It is supposed they are bound for Home Point, up the river, to watch for the rumored arrival of Pinkerton and non-union men.

CHICAGO, July 9.—The building trades of this city, representing 20,000 men, sent a message to the Homestead strikers last night congratulating them on the "manly stand they have taken in the face of all hazards," and tendering financial assistance.

In addition, when their cash gives out, they have undertaken to act as the stores. Said one of the locked-out men, who is entitled to speak for the workmen, this morning: "It is now a question of endurance. There will be no blowing up with dynamite. We are not of an anarchistic type. Should it come to the worst, we would take up our things and walk out of town."

BRENSHAM, Tex., July 9.—Two twelve-pounder Napoleon cannons, the first issued to the Brethrenfield artillery, were shipped north last evening with this direction attached: "Strikers, Homestead, Pa." The shelling of a steamboat is reported.

HOMESTEAD, July 9.—The following telegram was received this afternoon: "Three cars of Pinkertons, two cars of ammunition, passed here at 9 o'clock last night for the purpose of keeping the peace. It is stated that the Pinkertons are employing men and missing them at various places. Leaders deny the truth of the report that cannons were being shipped to them from Texas. They say the Pinkerton men have not yet taken the mill property recently, or that they are fortifying against attack."

Men have made arrangements with the labor leaders in this and other States to keep the Pinkerton movements and promptly notify leaders here.

In Illinois the Federation of Labor have men prepared to have Pinkertons arrested and sent to the State penitentiary. Any attempt is made to leave the State. Knights of Labor are also actively working in behalf of the Amalgamated Association, and an endeavor will be made to form a union with all organized labor unions.

THE FIRE AT ST. JOHNS. ST. JOHNS, N. F., July 9.—[By the Associated Press.]—The fire which broke out here yesterday is still burning. Six hundred buildings are already destroyed, and the loss will reach \$60,000,000. Fifteen thousand people are homeless and destitute. All the finest buildings in town are destroyed and it is thought many lives are lost.

The English Cathedral, considered to be the best piece of Gothic architecture on this continent, and which has been in building for fifty years, is also ruined. The people are all paralyzed and the fire department is also powerless to keep the flames from being burned with no attempt made to save them. Thieves entered the deserted houses. The fire this morning broke out among the residences in town, and it looks as if the whole town would be destroyed. Wires are down and there is no communication with the outside world.

HALETX, N. S., July 9.—At twenty minutes of eight tonight telegraphic communication with St. Johns was restored. The first dispatch received after the wires were again in working order stated the loss by fire was placed at \$20,000,000.

TELEGRAPHIC SPARKS.

Henry Jenard, a horse thief, escaped from the San Diego jail today. J. L. Forepaugh, a well known capitalist of St. Paul, committed suicide today.

The St. Louis, Alton and Springfield Road was sold at Master's sale today for \$1,000,000.

George Smith was hanged today at Sherman, Texas, for the murder of Isbet, of Bells, Texas.

Limerick rioters last night smashed all the windows in the house of O'Keefe and O'Brien, Parnellite leaders.

At 6 o'clock this evening the English election returns show the choice of 187 Conservatives, 157 Liberals, 28 Liberal-Unionists, 23 Anti-Parnellites, 4 Parnellites.

Last night a fire destroyed the new town of Biwabic at the iron mines of the Cincinnati, Biwabic, Canton and McKinley companies on the Mesab range, near Duluth. The loss is \$50,000.

Chairman Bland of the Coinage Committee has introduced in the House a resolution making the silver bill the special order for Monday, consideration to be continued from day to day till finally concluded.

It is reported the Cone Island steamboat Cepheus ran down a row-boat containing five persons, and three occupants were drowned. A number of Christian Endeavorers were boating yesterday, and possibly some of these may have been the victims.
