'working women's guild.' By that term I mean self-supporting women that realize the vital principle that the only way to dignify labor is to infuse it with intelligence, and under tails head is included every occupation open to women.

'What particularly recommends a woman's club is so much pleasure for the little money spent. By the payment of \$1 annually from 200 to 500 members, we could at once have attractive assembly and reading rooms. With the addition of a small monthly fee we could soon establish a systematic course of instruction to the working women, besides a course of lectures, music and dramatic and other entertainments. This would insure instruction and entertainment to a large number, and surely every body will be willing to work for it. Let there be no jealousy regarding the honors that be given the few women that may be put forward for the positions, for honor and glory falling to them means honor and glory to all women, and that means the success of a woman's club for Duluth.
