New Mill at Highland.

A new sawmill is being built near Highland on the Duluth & Iron Range road by C. M. Hill. The mill will be a single saw of the circular variety, and it will have a daily capacity of about 50,000 feet. It is said that Mr. Hill has secured recently about 10,000,000 feet of pine in the vicinity of the new mill and as he owns considerable standing pine on the Cloquet river that can be manufactured at this mill it is the intention to saw it there.

Telephone Committee Report.

The Chamber of Commerce will meet tomorrow afternoon instead of today. The special committee having the matter of an investigation of the telephone question will be ready to report at that time. The committee has met nearly every day since it took up the work almost a fortnight since and much work has been accomplished. The ground has been gone over very thoroughly, and it is expected that a complete report will be made.

Edward Kenney Dead.

Edward Kenney, of Merricksville, Canada, died at St. Mary's hospital at 4:30 Monday morning of pneumonia. He was 31 years of age and was a brother of Archie Kenney of the Big Duluth. The funeral will be at 9 o'clock this morning from the cathedral and the body will be placed in the receiving vault at Forest Hill cemetery until relatives are communicated with. The deceased was well known here. His illness was of short duration.

Building Improvements.

The building inspector has issued a permit to A. L. Orlean to make a \$1,500 addition to a brick building between Lake avenue and First avenue east on Superior street, occupied by Gray Bros. and Bridgeman & Russell. The addition will be a change in the upper story.

C. H. Leonard got a permit to build a frame shop and dwelling on the south side of Michigan street, between Twelfth and Thirteenth avenues east. The building will cost \$100.

The new train service to be inaugurated March 12 by the Northern Pacific will enable travelers to make close connections to all points on the Northern Pacific line between Brainerd and Minneapolis. There has been complaint for the past 10 years in regard to the unsatisfactory service to these points. After the 12th the train will leave Duluth at 8 o'clock in the morning and reach Brainerd at 12:25. There will be a wait of about 20 minutes at Brainerd when the traveler will take his departure for the points to the south on the line including Little Falls, St. Cloud, Sauk Rapids, Elk River, Royalton and Anoka.
