

# MARKS THREW BOUQUETS.

**They Were Not of a Choice Variety,  
However, and Trouble Follows.**

Thomas Marks, a lineman in the employ of the Commercial Light & Power Co., was fined \$1 and costs in police court yesterday for expressing his opinion of W. E. Bates, a private detective, in terms not sanctioned by law. Marks believed the detective was taking a too active part in the linemen's strike and resented it. He saw Bates on the opposite side of the street the other afternoon and the sight inspired him to use the language that resulted in his arrest.

Louis McIlroy, a young man who was arrested on complaint of George Bartlett, of Winton, charged with defrauding him out of transportation from Duluth to Ely, under the pretense that he would work for him, was held to the grand jury yesterday. McIlroy was first arraigned and tried in police court in the belief that his offense was within the jurisdiction of that court. He was found guilty and Judge Edson was about to sentence him when he discovered that he had no authority, but that the misdemeanor was punishable only by the district court. As the maximum penalty for the offense is but \$25 fine and 60 days in the county jail, the circumstances under which McIlroy had committed it did not appear to justify his incarceration in the county jail until court meets in September, and as he had but little money he was released on his own recognizance until that time.

George Probeck, a contractor, at 103 West Superior street, was arrested yesterday on complaint of his wife, who charged him with assaulting her. She asserted her husband came home intoxicated the other evening and abused her shamefully in the presence of a couple of neighbors, and in addition addressed some indecent remarks to the latter. Probeck denied the charge, however, and his trial was set for July 16 at 10 o'clock.

Louis Oreckowsky was fined \$5 and costs for striking David Azinsky and William Locking was obliged to donate \$3 to the city for riding his bicycle on the sidewalk.
