per cent of the delinquent taxes.

IT'S "LIEUT." BARNARD NOW.

President McKinley Commission
Deputy Postmaster's Son.

F. H. Barnard, deputy postmaster,
has received word that his son, Joseph
H. Barnard, who has been in the Phil-
ippines for about two years as a troop-
er in the Third U. S. cavalry, has been
commissioned a second lieutenant in
that arm of the service. Joseph was
examined for a commission several
weeks ago, and, to the gratification of
his relatives and friends, received an
average percentage of over ninety. His
appointment was made by the presi-
dent last week. Lieutenant Barnard is
twenty-three years of age, and was a
member of the Fourteenth Minnesota
at the breaking out of the Spanish-
American war. He served with the
regiment at Chickamauga, and when
mustered out in the winter he re-enlist-
ed with the Third cavalry at Minne-
apolis and was sent to the Philippines,
where he has remained ever since. For
the past six months he has been de-
tailed as an interpreter, having made
himself conversant with Spanish dur-
ing his stay.

BURGESS COMPANY FINED.

Convicted of Violating Ordinance on
Electric Wiring.

The Burgess Electric company was
convicted in police court yesterday of
violating a city ordinance by placing
electric wires in buildings without per-
mission of the city authorities, and
sentenced to pay a fine of \$5 and costs.
A stay of ten days was granted, during
which time the company will appeal
the case to the higher court, to test the
validity of the ordinance involved.

The case was argued last week by E.
A. McMahon for the defense and J. D.
Holmes for the city. The defense
moved that the case be dismissed on
the ground that the ordinance was in-
definite and uncertain in its require-
ments and also that the complaint was
not sufficient to indicate that an of-
fense had been committed. Judge Gear-
hart took the motion under advisement
until yesterday, when he announced his
decision as stated.

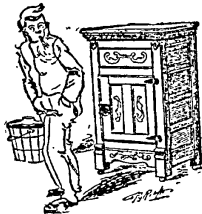

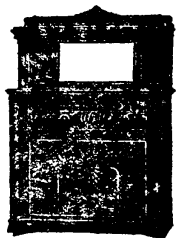

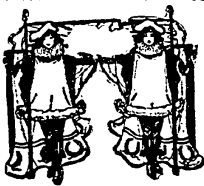
