The fire department was called out yesterday morning to extinguish a fire in a Great Northern box car filled with lime and cement, belonging to Cutler & Gilbert. The lime is believed to have caught fire from water that leaked in the car. It was damaged to the extent of \$100.

There is some talk of requesting President House of the Duluth & Iron Range road to run shortline trains between the Union depot and Lakeside morning, noon and evening, until such time as the street railway tracks are renewed and ready for continuous operation of cars.
