

not right, and I believe that the full license fee for parades and exhibits should be collected, and unless it is collected there should be no parades or shows.

I. Freimuth: "I am not in favor of taking the parades off Superior street. If the crowds come on the street and stand around, they become tired waiting, drop into the stores and do more or less trading. The parades do not interfere with business, but on the contrary help the retail houses."

H. F. Williamson, of Williamson & Mendenhall: "I know of no reason for shutting parades off Superior street. They do not interfere with business. Why not let the people have a good time looking at the parade? They will see it to better advantage on Superior street than on First street."

Other interviews similar to these could be given. Only one business man of those interviewed preferred the First street route. Enough statements have been given to indicate the feeling of Superior street business firms, and the hope is expressed that the mayor will change his program when he learns what the sentiment is.

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### Lot Sale in the New Town of Nashwauk.

Lots in the new Town of Nashwauk will be put on sale at the office of E. J. Longyear at Hibbing, Minnesota, Monday May 23rd. Nashwauk is located in the Southwest corner of Town 57-22 between Hibbing and Grand Rapids in the immediate vicinity of the Hawkins mine. This town is far enough distant from both Grand Rapids and Hibbing to have a large field to itself. It will become one of the most important towns on the Mesaba Range. Much iron ore is being shown up in that vicinity; a railroad is now in the course of construction into this location and will be completed this fall. Nashwauk now centers the most active field of iron exploration in the Lake Superior district. Nashwauk is located in one of the best pine timber forests in Minnesota, and like Hibbing will be both a mining and lumber town. There is immediate demand for stores in all lines at this new location.
