

GRAND JURY'S WORK IS DONE

**LARGE BATCH OF INDICTMENTS
COVERING MANY CRIMES IS
BROUGHT IN.**

NO ROAST IN FORM OF REPORT

**E. C. LACHANCE OF NORTHERN HO-
TEL IS AMONG THE VICTIMS.**

**Charged With Running An Assigna-
tion House—Mallough and
Fobister Released.**

The grand jury finished its labors yesterday afternoon, quite a batch of indictments being returned.

The jury made no report and the business was disposed of with dispatch.

Among those indicted were Charles M. Forest and Alphonse Le Tourneau, who are charged with having a set of 48 indecent pictures in a machine which they exhibited for gain at their saloon, 601 West Superior street. The men were in municipal court a few days ago for the same offense. Each paid \$50. The indictment is brought under a state law while the other was for a violation of a city ordinance.

Eugene C. La Chance, proprietor of the Northern hotel and saloon at 208 West Superior street, was indicted on the charge of running an assignation house. This resort has long been a notorious one and many times has come under the attention of the authorities. A few weeks ago it was shown that a young girl 14 years of age had spent the night there. La Chance pleaded not guilty and was released on \$1,000 bonds.

Two indictments were returned against Julius Hagen. The one charges him with stealing a pair of trousers and the other a striped coat from Joseph Sosnovsky, who conducts a small clothing store on West Superior street.

A true bill was brought in against Alexander Tifer charged with assault in the second degree. Tifer is accused of hitting Herman Greenwald over the head with a club. Greenwald sustained a severe injury and was in the hospital for some time, his condition being so serious that it was feared that he might die from the blow.

Richard Harper was indicted for forgery in the second degree. He is charged with passing a check for \$79.25 on A. S. Hyman, the signature of P. Drummond being the alleged forgery.

Arthur Cox and Irvan Bronger, two young men must stand trial for stealing flax from box cars belonging to the Northern Pacific railway.

Two indictments, one charging burglary in the third and the other larceny in the second degree were found against John Murphy. He is said to have broken into a house occupied by Mrs. Annie O'Neal at which time he stole a suit of clothes belonging to Joseph Wakelay.

Anton Heibar was indicted for assault alleged to have been committed with a knife upon Anton Kosmerl at Eveleth. Second degree is charged.

John Foley was indicted for burglary in the third degree being charged with breaking into a place at McKinley and also for an unmentionable crime.

Forgery in the second degree was written on the indictment brought in against Charles H. Rupp. He is a timber cruiser and is accused of passing several forged checks in this city and also in Superior. On the night that he was arrested he had in his pocket three bottles of poison. His actions have been very queer and his wife filed an information for insanity against him.

Frank Shearer was indicted for larceny in the first degree. He is alleged to have stolen \$89 and a watch from Frank Smith at the Denver lodging house 21 Fifth avenue West.

No bills were brought in against W. B. Mallough and Thomas Fobister, two young men from West Duluth, who were charged with robbery. They have been out on ball since their examination in municipal court.

There are some other indictments but the persons have not been taken in custody.
