

TWO MEN MEET VIOLENT DEATHS

FINLANDER RUN OVER BY TRAIN AND BODY FEARFULLY MANGLED.

ORE FALLS ON A MINER

SMOTHERED BEFORE HE COULD BE RESCUED FROM POSITION.

Many Other Items of Interest From Metropolis of the Soft Ore District.

HIBBING, Sept. 26.—Edward Lahtinen, a Finlander, while walking home from work at midnight last Monday, was instantly killed by an ore train near the trestle bridge on the Eastern Minnesota Ry. The body was cut up very badly. The deceased was about 24 years of age and single.

John Tervo was instantly killed at the Chisholm mine last Monday. The deceased was standing under a chute when a car load of ore was dumped on him, smothering him to death. He was about 50 years of age and unmarried.

In the case of the State of Minnesota vs. Andrew Kuttunen the defendant was bound over to the grand jury. Kuttunen while working in the Rust mine became involved in an altercation with an Italian named Joe Marachine and wound the matter up by stabbing the Italian with a candle stick used by miners, which has a very sharp point. The instrument penetrated the lungs and caused a severe wound. The defendant was released by Judge Lekne on \$200 bonds to appear in November.
