

# FRAUD CHARGE FOR A CLOTHIER

## Woodsman Causes Arrest of Alexander Oreckovsky.

Joseph Angers, a woodsman who was just in, got in the wrong place yesterday when he went to buy a suit of clothes and when he found out his mistake he had Alexander Oreckovsky arrested on a charge of fraud. Oreckovsky is accused of obtaining \$20 from Angers, through false representations.

While Angers was working in the woods, a month or more ago, he encountered a traveling agent for the Eagle Clothing company of Duluth and placed an order for a \$30 suit of clothes. He paid \$10 down on the purchase and his measurement was taken, with the understanding that the garments were to be made and delivered to him when he came down to Duluth.

### Seeks His New Suit.

When Angers reached the city yesterday morning he lost no time in hunting for his new suit, intending to take it along with him to his room and put it on. On his way up from the depot he stopped in at the Fifth avenue clothing store and asked where the Eagle establishment was located.

"This is the place right here," the affable clerk is said to have responded.

"Well, I ordered a suit from your man Julius, while I was up in the woods," said Angers, "and I've come to get it. Where's Julius?"

"Oh, he's still out on the road, but we can fix you out all right. What kind of a suit was it?"

Angers described the clothes and he says he was told they were all ready for him. "Just wait a minute and I'll get them."

The clerk hunted in a pile of clothing in the rear of the store and finally drew forth the suit which Angers was led to believe he had ordered. He took the garments and paid over the balance, \$20 and then left the store.

### Arrays Himself In New Attire.

Angers arrayed himself in the new suit and submitted himself to the inspection of his friends. They did not enthuse, at all, over his purchase and recommended that numerous wrinkles be eliminated. The coat didn't hang right and the breeches were altogether too roomy. Furthermore the cloth seemed rather shoddy for a \$30 made-to-order suit.

Angers went out with blood in his eye intending to look up the man who had sold him the suit, but got mixed in his directions and had to inquire his way to the Eagle Clothing house. When he found the place he was astonished to discover that it was a different store from the one in which he had secured the clothes. The Eagle people had a well fitting, well made suit, awaiting his order.

Angers was convinced that he had been duped and prompt steps were taken to punish the offender. At the suggestion of the manager of the Eagle Clothing house he returned to the place where he had obtained the suit, taking a witness along with him and it is said that Oreckovsky, the clerk in charge, repeated his assertions that his was the establishment with which the original contract had been made.

Then Angers got out a warrant and had Oreckovsky arrested. But his troubles are not yet over. His \$20 is gone and he has no money with which to complete the payment for the garments for which he originally contracted.
