

EIGHTH GRADE GRADUATION

Interesting Exercises Given Last Night at High School.

Friends and relatives in large numbers assembled last night in the assembly hall of the Central High school to witness the graduation of pupils of the eighth grades. About 250 sweet girl graduates tastefully and prettily gowned, and nearly as many boys, gathered together and presented a delightful spectacle. The exercises will probably be the last in which all of the schools in the city will participate, as there is not enough room for the friends of such large classes as are now being graduated.

Superintendent of Schools R. E. Denfeld, who presided over the exercises, gave the members of the large class a few parting words of advice calling attention to the long years of study that each had spent in the local schools in order to gain their coveted diplomas and reminding them of the years yet to come and the subsequent battle of life for which they are now preparing themselves.

Owing to the unusually large class, he announced, diplomas would not be awarded at the completion of the exercises but would be distributed by the principals of the respective schools.

Song by Graduates.

The program was opened with a song by the graduates: "Praise to Thee." Miss Edith Wheeler, of the Adams school, rendered an amusing recitation, "The Cow and the Bishop," which was followed by a humorous selection entitled "His Mother's Boy," by Miss Sjoselius, of the Emerson school. Walter McComber's declamation "Herve Riel" was well delivered; and Miss Meldrum's reading "Home Sweet Home," was pleasing. Kenneth Kant, of the Franklin school, made a good impression with a comic reading called "The Canvasser of the National Portrait Gallery;" Miss Edith Hopkins described "How the Old Horse Won the Bet," the story of "The Old Man and Jim" was told by Albert Wayne.

"The Legend of the Bell" was sung by Miss Emily Baker and the class; a declamation on the "Duties of American Citizenship" was given by Clara Shaver of Lester Park; the Indian club drill by the Jefferson school was a pleasing feature; "Our Country's Greatest Glory" was told by Wm. P. Hicken, of Lakeside; "The Denominational Garden" was read by Miss Lucile M. Bradley, of the Jackson school; "The Death Bridge of the Tay," was given by Miss Laura Le Duc; "Abraham Lincoln," was the subject of the declamation of R. L.
