"The old days of feeling that any work in relief of the distressed should carry with it a sad and mournful demeanor, and that only with an air of sacrifice should benefits be conferred have happily taken their departure from the land, and now the thought has so surely taken its place, that gifts carry with them the impress of their inception. What happier air could be placed about the means to give warmth and light to poor little children, than that coming as the free will offering from those whom circumstances have so placed that enjoyment of a surplus of this world's good is their portion instead of a struggle to obtain just these things that are necessary to retain life.
