

GOOD YEAR AHEAD FOR THE VARSITY

Rearrangement of Studies Makes Early Registration Necessary.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 24.—Increase in the number of subjects and a complete rearrangement of the recitation schedule at the university has caused unusual worry among the students. Although the registration does not begin until next Wednesday, nearly a hundred students flocked into the registrar's office this morning to see about their conditions and extra work.

This year, for the first time in the history of the "U," there will be no regular weekly holiday. Recitations will be held every day in the week in order to make smaller classes and keep pace with the expected increase in enrollment.

On account of the uncertainty of the crops in the northwest, it is not known whether the registration will be in proportion with that of other years, but a notable increase is expected. More personal inquiries and applications for catalogues have been received this summer than ever before, and Registrar Pierce is confident that the enrollment will pass the 4,000 mark. The greatest number of these applications come from northwestern Iowa and from South Dakota, where several alumni have done missionary work.

Several new instructors for the underclassmen have been appointed from the student body and from the graduates of last year. Lillian Cohen, instructor in chemistry last year, has been made an associate professor and a member of the faculty. J. E. Fyans of the East high school, will be an instructor in the French department and E. Meloms an instructor in the Spanish department. John Jurgensen, who was graduated last June, will take postgraduate work and will be an instructor in German. O. P. McElmeet, a member of the debating team, will be an instructor in rhetoric. Other instructors will probably be appointed from the student body after the registration closes.

There are no new buildings or equipment this year, but the two physics buildings and the school of mines erected last year will make room for nearly five hundred more students. The rooms vacated by these two departments will be occupied by the botany and engineering departments.

The registration for the academic and engineering departments will begin Aug. 30, and the recitations will begin the Monday following.
