D. C. Thompson, the lumberman, has returned from Michigan, where he has been for several weeks. He had planned a southern trip, but Mrs. Thompson, who has been an invalid for three years, and who was at Grand Rapids, Mich., grew worse, and he was sent for. Mrs. Thompson died Feb. 26, at the age of 43 years. The funeral was held at Muskegon. Mrs. Thompson had been a resident of Duluth with her husband for six years, and she enjoyed a wide circle of friends.

Frederik Roon, 27 years of age, a native of Sweden, who came to Duluth in June, 1893, was granted full citizenship papers in the office of the clerk of the circuit court yesterday, when he renounced forever all allegiance and fidelity to all foreign princes and potentates, particularly the king of Norway and Sweden. Citizenship papers were also granted to Isidor Zien, 22 years of age, a native of the domain of the Czar of old Russia. Zien landed in this country at the port of New York half a dozen years ago, and has been in Duluth more than two years.

Announcement is made by the United States Civil Service commission of an examination to be held March 29, at the federal building for securing eligibles for certification to fill vacancies for the position of apprentice draftsman in the office of the chief of ordinances at Washington, which position carries a salary of \$360 a year. The age limit is from 16 to 20 years and the examination is open to all citizens of the United States.

Michael Kenney, blacksmith, of Duluth, yesterday, filed a petition in voluntary bankruptcy in the United States district court, setting out that, while his assets were \$2,070 and his debts but \$1,408.02, still, as \$1,730 of his resources were legally exempt, he desired to be adjudged a bankrupt.
