Although the grand jury will not convene until September the prisoner has the alternative of pleading guilty before the district judges and receiving sentence at any time. Such action has been taken by several prisoners for indictable offenses since the enactment of the state law to avoid long periods of imprisonment while waiting for the grand jury.
