Andrew Danielson, who was locked up Friday on the charge of insanity has been removed to St. Francis hospital for treatment. The demented man was examined by Judge Larson, who pronounced the case a serious one and expressed his doubts as to the final outcome. The judge stated that where religion is the weight that preys upon the mind it is only in very rare cases that the patient recovers.

A bunch of Billings Park boys attended the juvenile session of the municipal court Saturday morning. They were charged with disturbing the slumbers of several good citizens in that part of the city. Judge Parker put the case over for one week.
