

SUING FOR BALANCE ON SALOON FIXTURES

Haskel G. Fischbein, one of the trustees of the St. Paul Furniture company, is suing W. M. Abrahamson and his brother Julius, for \$500, which he alleges is due his company on bar fixtures made for the Sterling saloon in the Lowell block. The trial of the action was begun yesterday before Judge J. D. Ensign in district court, Attorney C. E. Adams representing the St. Paul people and Bert Fesler having charge of the defense.

In stating his case to the jury at the opening of the trial, Attorney Adams said that W. M. Abrahamson and his brother purchased \$1,700 worth of bar fixtures from the St. Paul Furniture company in December, 1902. He said they paid \$1,200 of the original bill, leaving a balance of \$500 which they have at various times, since the making of the contract, refused to pay.

The defense acknowledges the receipt of the goods and the price agreed on by the contracting parties, but says that the fixtures were of an inferior grade and not the kind ordered.
