The quickest, surest, neatest, easiest and most effective way to stop a chimney fire is to take a large wet cloth and wind it around the stove pipe just above the stove. The moisture from the wet cloth forms a cloud of steam inside the pipe which raises and smothers the fire in the chimney almost at once. This method has proven effective in the case of a chimney fire so fierce that the stove-pipe all the way from the chimney was red hot, and has never been known to fail. The chief beauty of the plan is its simplicity and the ease with which it can be used by anyone. Simply saturate a large cloth with water, wind it around the stove-pipe at any point it is hot—and the hotter the better—and the steam generated inside the pipe will do the rest.
