

CASH CARRIER SUIT NEAR TRIAL

Case of John Brennan Against
Albenberg & Co. to Be Taken
Up This Week.

One of the interesting suits scheduled for trial in the circuit court this week is that of John Brennan against Albenberg & Co. The plaintiff seeks to secure an injunction restraining the defendants from operating their present system of cash carriers, it being claimed that they make a great many reverberating sounds, much to the annoyance of the plaintiff, as well as other tenants of the building in which the store is located.

The suit has been pending for four months, during which time defendants have tried various means of adjusting the carriers so as not to annoy the occupants of the building. A new device for the carriers to "bump" against was installed a couple of days ago and, according to a set of resolutions signed by a number of tenants of the building yesterday, the carriers are now being operated in such a manner that even the most restless person might not be disturbed. The resolutions, which were addressed to Albenberg & Co., read as follows:

"We, your co tenants, hereby express to you our greatest appreciation for the courtesy and public spirit you have shown in rearranging your cash carrier system so that it may be operated noiselessly and without annoyance to your long-suffering neighbors. It was a concession granted in a spirit of magnanimity to avoid disquieting litigation which could not fail to provoke our highest commendation. This exhibition of altruism on your part will further cement the bonds of fraternal feeling existing between us, and guarantee a continuance of harmonious relations for many years to come."
