

CLAIM TURNED DOWN BY JURY

Golda Sosnovsky Gets Nothing for Her Tumble on the Stairs.

Golda Sosnovsky cannot recover anything for the injuries which she claimed to have sustained by falling down the steps in a store belonging to Joseph E. Fox. The jury brought in a verdict for the defendant in Judge Cant's division of the district court yesterday. The plaintiff asked for \$1,025 damages. The verdict was reached by the jury Saturday morning but there was no session of the court to which it could be given and the decision was sealed and presented yesterday.

The case of the Western Land association against the Wisconsin Central railroad was on hearing before Judge Cant yesterday afternoon. The land company objects to the award which has been made for some of its property condemned by the railway. The land is on the lower side of Superior street between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth avenues west. Several expert witnesses were on the stand yesterday. Their ideas of the value of the lots differed greatly. One witness placed the value at \$5,000 a lot and the estimated worth was graded from that down to \$1,500. It was suggested by the attorneys that the jury be allowed to see the property in dispute and they were excused during the afternoon for that purpose. The case will be resumed this morning.

John Hakman's suit against the Oliver Iron Mining company to collect damages for alleged personal injuries was on trial before Judge Dibell during the day. It is expected to be able to finish this case today and the court will then take up the criminal cases which remain on the calendar.
