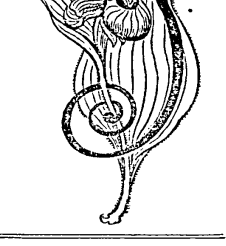
THE EVENTS OF THIS WEEK.
