Moses Cook, the local pawnbroker,
who was sentenced and fined recently
for selling jewelry at auction, with
the alternative of a jail term, has giving notice or an appeal to the supreme
court of this county, denying a write

of habeas corpus. The papers were filed in district court yesterday by Baldwin, Baldwin & Dancer, Cook's attorneys.

Mr. Cook defended on the grounds that the city has no right to prohibit

that the city has no right to prohibit the sale of watches and jewelry at auction, and, as the case was a test case, it was watched with considerable interest by the jewelers and pawnborkers of this city. Judge Cant, who heard the argu-

ments in the habeas corpus proceedings, held that the city ordinance prohibiting the sale of jewelry at audtion, was enacted for the benefit of the public and upheld its enforcement.
