

# WITNESSES LEAVE FOR MINNEAPOLIS

## Police Officials and Others Sum- moned to Testify in "Bessie" Kidnaping Case.

A delegation of Superior people, who have been summoned in the "Bessie" kidnaping case, which comes to trial at Minneapolis today, left last evening for the Flour City. Among those who went to Minneapolis were Captain Olsen, Lieutenant Scoon and Detective Dill of the police department; Julius Cohen, clerk of the municipal court; Miss Anderson, matron at the Children's home, and a Mrs. Polinsky.

The defendant in the case referred to is Mrs. Stans Jarumusik, a former resident of this city. She is charged with abducting the infant child of a family named Glaque on Minneapolis, some four months ago. Mrs. Jarumusik brought the babe to Superior and placed it in the Children's home. She was arrested by Detective Dill and the child was recovered by the detective and Lieutenant Scoon. The child and its abductor were taken to Minneapolis by Captain Olsen.

The officers will testify to their connection with the affair. Julius Cohen will testify concerning the defendant's marriage to Jarumusik under peculiar circumstances in the local court a year ago. Miss Anderson has been summoned to relate the bringing of the child to the Children's home. Mrs. Polinsky is said to be able to tell something of the defendant's past life as well as circumstances connected with her marriage to Jarumusik.

The whereabouts of Jarumusik is unknown. He is said to have deserted his wife shortly after their marriage in court.

## REPORTS OF HAWTHORNE FIRE EXAGGERATED

Early reports received from Hawthorne Saturday to the effect that the town was in danger from a fire in the saw pile at the lumber mill there, were much overdrawn according to a long distance telephone message to the News Tribune yesterday. This conveyed the information that the fire had never been very serious, although it had stubbornly resisted efforts to extinguish it. The last ember had died away yesterday and the men who had been fighting the fire had all returned to their usual duties.

### MISS BERTHIAUME RECOVERS.
