MISS MARGARET PANTON was the youthful hostess on Friday evening of the season's most brilliant social event, the Colonial cotillion given at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Panton.

To spectators watching the lads and lasses in their teens who danced through the graceful numbers of the cotillion, time seemed to have retraced its steps a century and a half, for the happy young faces were crowned with powdered hair and quaint little black patches accentuated the clear young complexions. The costumes were consistent, even to the old-fashioned shoes, and the three-cornered hats. The setting arranged for the cotillion was perfect and carried out the spirit of Colonial days. The big ball room was decorated with flags, over which presided the eagle. The mantel was banked with geraniums, phlox and ferns. The orchestra played from an alcove. In the billiard room, a royal eagle spread his wings above the broad table and clusters of old-fashioned pinks and golden glow suggested nosegays from bygone gardens.

Mrs. George H. Crosby and Mrs. John C. Williams presided over the punch bowl in this room, which is just off the ball room. Miss Ingram, of Chicago, led the cotillion. There were five figures including the graceful minuet and the moon dance, during which the room was darkened save from light thrown out by a gigantic moon in the mystic light of which the young people glided about like a company of fairies. One figure was beautiful with a garland drill.

After the cotillion, a gigantic Teddy Bear was ushered into the room. The boys of the party rained blows upon the bear and the breast of that generous animal opened to permit balls of confetti to roll out on the floor. The merriment was at its height as the young folks pelted one another

with the confetti and danced a bea-dance around "Teddy."
