

WEDDING IS MOST ELABORATE EVENT

Reception and Sumptuous Feast Follow Simon-Weinstein Marriage Ceremony.

The wedding of Miss Sarah Vivian Simon of this city and Harold Weinstein of Coleraine yesterday was an elaborate event. The bride is a daughter of W. Simon of 406 East Fifth street, and the bridegroom a merchant at Coleraine. There were over 500 guests at the wedding ceremony at the synagogue, corner of Third avenue east and Third street, and at the wedding feast which followed at the banquet room in the Temple building. The festivities ended with a dance in the ball room.

Miss Sadie Berkson was maid of honor, and the bridesmaids were Misses Bessie Cowl of Minneapolis, Gustie Simon of Gilbert, Sarah Marcus of Minneapolis and Rose Witz of Duluth. The best man was Louis Helperin, and the groomsmen were Al Lieberman of Bovey, Samuel Altman of Chisholm, Isadore Cohen of Chisholm and Robert Simon of Gilbert. The ring bearer was little Robert Frank, nephew of the groom, and the flower girl was Miss Florence Simon, sister of the bride.

The bridal party, going down the middle aisle of the synagogue, passed under four arches of evergreens decorated with carnations. The arches were held by the maids and groomsmen. The bride entered supported by her father and mother. The groom followed supported by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Weinstein of Bovey. At the altar the bridal party was met by Rabbi Teplitz and Rabbi Kissan. Stationed in the gallery was an orchestra, which played Lohengrin's wedding march, and there was a choir of 20 children. The wedding occurred at 5:30.

The bride was gowned in pink, imported duchess satin trimmed with real lace. She wore a bridal veil and carried a bouquet of bride's roses and lilies of the valley. Miss Berkson, maid of honor, carried American Beauty roses.

A reception was held at the hall in the Temple building from 7 to 7:30 o'clock. The orchestra also played at the reception, at the banquet which followed and at the dance.

The tables and the banquet hall were beautifully decorated. William Abrahamson was the toastmaster and toasts were responded to as follows:
