"Diamonds and Hearts," the three-act comedy drama presented by the class of '09 on Friday night, was a revelation to the capacity house of what can be done by amateurs in the way of entertaining the public. To begin with there were no tiresome waltzes; the curtain rose promptly at the scheduled time, the ushering was perfect, and the play was not too long, being over by 10:15. The play itself was well chosen, with a plot full of human interest, but not too difficult for young actors. A clever interpolation was the "Country Choir" in the second act, with its "lost chords" and songs teeming with amusing bits. The jokes, as read by the farmer to his sister, were decidedly clever and up to date, one being that the Oliver Iron Mining company would silver next winter because their "coal" was "Oleco" out, and they probably

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wouldn't "cut in" to it. Sundry allusions to a tonnage tax on "Big John" were well received, as was the suggestion that Borge being a Norwegian would not stand for a tonnage tax on all the "Lute-fisk" caught in Lake Superior. Another unamateurish feature was the fact that every member of the cast could be heard distinctly all over the house, and there was no painful evidence of nervousness to mar the action, the effects were good.

Taken as a whole, the play was a distinct advance on anything yet given by the high school scholars, and showed evidence of careful and assiduous rehearsal. Now as to the players, the leading role of Bernice Halstead was played by Cleo Penton with a remarkable absence of nervousness. She was simple and unaffected throughout and was ably seconded by Antonio Sheen and Ruth Davis, the three presenting an animated trio of laughter-loving girlhood. Marjorie Shepherd's merry laugh was irresistible and the Yama dance at the end of the first act was very gracefully done by the three girls. One of the most effective parts was that of Mrs. Halstead, played by Dorothy Olcott, her majestic appearance and affected walk being especially taking. Her recitations were given clearly and distinctively read. The thankless role of Dwight Bradley, the needy fortune-hunter, was acceptably filled by Robert Ely, president of the class, his tall figure, and attenuated countenance making an admirable foil for her majestic mother. Harvard Rockwell, as a solemn bewickered attorney, both looked and acted the part with distinction. Roy Kent, a shrewd and somewhat western type, related much amusement by announcing himself as "Bill Dates, sheriff of St. Louis county."

The comedy parts were most admirably filled, and kept the house in a continual roar of laughing. Leonard McDougall was a typical shifthead dandy servant, with the correct dialect, and a fund of humorous byplay. Gladys Clark, as the old-maid mistress of a farm house, was in the manner of a homely, full of anxiety for the well-being of her guests, of admiration for her brother, and of pride in her nephew, the young doctor, a role which received capable interpretation by Jack Hurdon, and whose fox terrier, played by "Patience" Miller, was a feature of the first act. Without derogating the work of his fellow-actors, the first honors of the evening must go to John Quinn, who played the whole-souled farmer Abraham Barnes, with professional ease and aplomb. His make up, gestures, facial expressions and drawing voice were the country farmer to a T; his love-making was killingly funny, without being exaggerated. In fact, his reading of the part was one of the best amateur efforts ever seen in Duluth. The work of the "Country Choir" in the second act, deserves special praise. Erling Mostue, as Professor Thompson, the choir-leader, was inimitable, with his agonized gestures at the discomfiture of his sousa-like satisfaction when all went well, and his naive "Dutch" talk. The songs were cleverly and tastefully interpreted by Roger Woodbridge, Myrtle Pierce, Myrna Pressnell, John Quinn and Erling Mostue. A role which received capable interpretation by Jack Hurdon, and whose fox terrier, played by "Patience" Miller, was a feature of the first act.

The entire production was given under the management of A. F. M. Custance, who is to be congratulated on scoring another, and the greatest success in his long career as a musical director and manager of amateur performances in Duluth. With the exception of last year, the high school plays have been put on by him, and the pupils and public in general hailed with delight his return to the management.

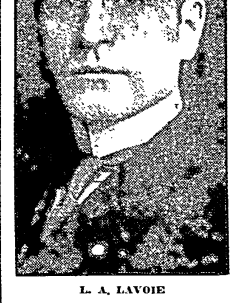
