

# "THROW 'EM BOTH INTO LAKE" HE SAYS

## Archie Gingold Dismissed as Juror in Fox Alienation Suit for Hostile Expression

There was a sensation in the district court before Judge Dibell early yesterday afternoon when Archie Gingold was excused from service as a juror for the remainder of the term because he had talked about a case about to be tried and couldn't state positively whether or not he had said of the plaintiff and defendant, "They both ought to be thrown into the lake."

The case was the \$25,000 alienation of affections suit of Joseph E. Fox against Albert Polinsky. O. J. Larson is attorney for the plaintiff and C. O. Baldwin for the defendant.

During the examination of Gingold, Mr. Larson brought out that he had talked about the case and probably formed an opinion. He then presented witnesses to show that Gingold had made the remarks above mentioned. The court promptly relieved Gingold from further duty.

When the jury was finally completed Mr. Fox's divorced wife was called as the first witness. She took the witness chair and told a story of intimacy with other men and admitted that she has been living in questionable places since she and Mr. Fox separated.

She said that she came to Duluth two weeks ago at her own expense to testify in the case against Polinsky. "How did you happen to do that?" asked Mr. Larson.

The tears came into the woman's eyes as she replied in quavering voice, in substance, that she felt that she had wronged her husband and wanted to help him, and further that she knew Polinsky to be responsible for the position she is now in.

Mrs. Fox repeated in detail all her misconduct and said she told her husband of it. She was still on the stand when court adjourned and her testimony will be resumed when court convenes this morning.
