

FORGER PLACED UNDER BONDS TO BE GOOD

W. G. West pleaded guilty yesterday in the district court before Judge Dibell to a charge of forgery which netted him \$16.50 when he passed a check at the Lenox hotel. He was placed under \$250 bonds and must also report once a month to the clerk of court for an indefinite period. The reason for leniency is that he has a family dependent upon his earnings.

Jacob Litman pleaded guilty to buying junk from minors and it cost him \$50. or 30 days in jail. He paid. It was alleged that he bought copper from three boys, Arthur Beausehman, 14; U. Wilson, 13, and William Parks, giving them 45 cents for it.

Pleas of not guilty were entered by W. A. Angus, alias G. A. Worthington, Thomas Jefferson, Chester O'Neil, Charles Travis and Rebe Grovanich. All will come up for trial later in the term.

W. A. Angus is charged with bigamy. He was arrested at the court house a few weeks ago just as he was leaving the court room, where he was plaintiff in an action for malicious prosecution against a former employer.

All the other men who pleaded not guilty, of whom the first three named are negroes, are charged with conducting unlicensed drinking places.
