Crime Was An Illusion.

Chief of Police Troyer received a letter yesterday from N. P. Bradstreet, sheriff of Boyd county, Neb., which stated that the authorities there have under arrest a man who claims he assisted in the murder of a little girl at Proctor in 1904 or 1905. It also states that the child's father is now doing time for the crime. The location of the tragedy is given as near the school house at Proctor. Neither the name of the father nor of the girl was given. The police upon investigation found that there is no record of such a crime ever having been committed here.
