## Old Landmark Removed.

Yesterday one of the oldest landmarks in the city was torn down. The H. M. Peyton homestead at the corner of Fifth avenue west and First street, adjacent to the federal building was completely demolished by wreckers. The house is associated with many memories of Duluth in its earliest days.

## Street Peddler Arrested.

David Goldfarb, a street peddler living at 322 East Ninth street was arrested by Officer Ullyou yesterday morning for peddling his wares through the city without a license. He pleaded not guilty to the charge in municipal court, and his trial is set for Saturday morning at 2 o'clock.

## Would Become Bankrupt.

Claude A. Berry of Duluth yesterday filed a petition to be adjudged a bankrupt in the United States district court, alleging his debts to be \$27,220.77. He is so poor at present that he makes affidavit that he has not sufficient funds to pay the fees and costs of the court. He has \$70.20 worth of personal property on which he claims an exemption and about \$100 in bills and a few other things which may be of value.

## Will Return Deserter.

Charles Bickus, the United States army deserter, who escaped from Fort Harrison near Missoula, Mont., some few months ago, coming direct to Duluth, and who was arrested Tuesday afternoon by Detective Shulte and Irvine, will be taken to Fort Snelling at St. Paul by the two officers probably this morning. In order to claim the reward an army deserter must be taken to the nearest army post by the officer or officers who apprehended him.

## Forgot to Sprinkle Coal.

Because he unloaded a wagon load of fine coal without taking the precaution of first sprinkling it with water, Charles A. Johnson, a teamster, was arrested yesterday morning at the instance of E. C. Perry, superintendent of the Sellwood building, charging him with violation of the health ordinance of the city. The coal being poured down the chute of the basement raised a fine cloud of dust through the office building, much to the annoyance of the inmates. It is said Johnson appeared before Judge Windom and pleaded guilty to the charge. He was fined \$3 which was paid.

## Detective's Claim Disallowed.

The claim for \$3,000 which was made by A. P. Worthington of Duluth, special detective for the Duluth, Missabe & Northern railroad, for the apprehension of one George Hamilton, the

would-be murderer of ex-Sheriff Beck of Houghton county, Michigan, was disallowed by the county commissioners of that county last Monday, that body claiming on the representation of the ex-sheriff himself that the detective's claim was absolutely groundless. Further particulars of the claim of the special officer could not be learned.

## Hurt in Runaway Accident.

Sustaining painful cuts and bruises, Albert Robertson, aged 17, son of Charles Robertson of Twenty-sixth avenue west and Twelfth street, was thrown forcibly to the pavement on East Superior street, near First avenue yesterday morning in a runaway accident. It seems that while Robert-

son was driving along Superior street, his horse gave a plunge forward, loosening a screw in one of the axles. The shaft became loose and the vehicle slewed to the curbing crashing against a lamp post. Robertson was thrown from the buggy by the impact.
