Boys Can Get Jobs.

Duluth boys who understand stenography and typewriting can secure a position in the service of the United States at a salary of \$840 to \$300 per year by passing a civil service examination which is to be held in Duluth June 18. Applicants must be 18 years old or over at the date of the examination. The successful candidates will be given work at Washington, D. C. Three days earlier, June 15, an examination will be held for laboratory helper in chemical biology in the bureau of plant industry at a salary of \$900 per year. Training, experience and practical knowledge of biology will count for 70 per cent of the credit given on the papers submitted.
