

NASHWAUK DAMAGE CASE IS WON BY SANTO SELLO

NASHWAUK, Sept. 1.—The case of Dominick De Britto against Santo Sello, a local saloon keeper and the latter's bondsmen for \$15,000 damages, which was tried in district court at Virginia, resulted in a verdict for the defendant. The jury was out six hours.

De Britto alleged that he was forcibly ejected from Sello's saloon in March, 1913, and as a result his feet were frozen and amputation was necessary. The case dragged in the courts nearly three years, De Britto's original counsel having died before it came to trial. Markus & Jaffee and Charles Verra are Sello's bondsmen. The case attracted widespread attention on the western Mesaba range.
