

ALIENS AVOIDED WAR, LOSE THEIR VOTE IN PEACE

Harry Dunlop Frazer Lyall Watson Smith Becomes Citizen.

Records Full Name.

When Harry D. Smith appeared for his final certificate of citizenship yesterday he wanted to be sure that there would be no hitch, so he gave the court his full name, "Harry Dunlop Frazer Lyall Watson Smith," and asked that his name be so inscribed on his certificate to forestall any possible duplication of the name Smith. He got it.

Citizenship was refused to Axel Sandberg and Hugo Lindgren when they appeared before Judge Bert Fesler in district court and admitted that they had claimed exemption from army service on the ground they were aliens. Out of 65 candidates who applied 33 were admitted to citizenship, including 12 who were ex-soldiers.

Two Austrians Apply.

In the majority of cases where final papers were withheld the applicant failed to appear. Two applicants of Austrian birth had their petitions continued until special dispensation has been received from the department of labor at Washington or until the peace treaty with Austria is signed.
