Employment for Physi- cally Handicapped Sought.

REHABILITATION of the physically handicapped has become an important work of the state during the past year. To restore to his place in the economic and social life of the community the cripple, the blind, the disabled is the work which calls for the co-operation of not only the employer and the handicapped man, but of society at large. To bring about this co-operation, the state department has been actively engaged during the year distributing literature, interviewing employers, and paving the way generally. A system has been worked out by which the man can be re-educated and trained at no cost to either the individual or the employer, to fill his old position or to enter another line of work.

In Duluth the Lighthouse has undertaken to be the clearing house for the handicapped who wish this re-education and employment and the employers who are willing to give these men an opportunity to prove that they may still find a place in a gainful occupation. Minneapolis Business Women Prepare For Opening Clubhouse

FORMAL OPENING of the Minneapolis Business Women's clubhouse will be held during the week of Feb. 15. The new clubhouse will contain a handsomely furnished lounge, a cafeteria, rest rooms, bowling alleys, showers and other features attractive to business women. A matron will be in charge at all times.

The announcement has been made by the president, Miss Gratia Countrymen, that the club roster contains the names of 1,422 paid members and 1,700 young women have signified their intention of joining the club but have not as yet paid their membership fees.

It is hoped, however, by the club members, that the splendid success of Minneapolis, where the club was reorganized only last summer, will spur the local organization to greater efforts.
