Dickinson, N. D.—Abraham Finn died Tuesday night from burns received in his tailor shop and caused by a gasoline explosion. He was 23 years old and was born in Russia. He came here from Fargo early in the summer. A sister, Mrs. Henry Miller of Madison, Minn., will come to take charge of the remains, which will be placed in a Jewish cemetery at Fargo.

Calumet, Mich.—The trainmen of the Duluth, South Shore & Atlantic and Mineral Range railroads are busy making the necessary arrangements for an outing on Sunday, Aug. 20, which probably will be held at L'Anse.

La Crosse, Wis.—Sam Sasale, aged 16 years, heir to a fortune, and son of wealthy people in Dunkirk, N. Y., was caught by the police here after spending two weeks wandering around the country. "My folks are too strict," Casale told the police, "and I wanted to shift for myself." He was sent back in charge of a special officer.

Hancock, Mich.—Peter Sterhia, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sterhia of Dollar Bay, died Sunday afternoon at St. Joseph's hospital of lockjaw, resulting from stepping upon a rusty nail a short time ago. The boy was 13 years of age, and is the third child which Mr. Sterhia has lost by death in about a year, a 4-month-old daughter dying last June and in November an 11-year-old girl was taken away.

Minot, N. D.—The state normal board Wednesday elected Prof. A. G. Crane of Jamestown, president of the new Minot normal. Mr. Crane secured his education in Minnesota, having graduated from Carlton college. He taught in the district schools of Ottertail county and later in village schools at various places in Minnesota.

Calumet, Mich.—Margaret McGlue, of Ontonagon, fell from the second story window of the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Robinson and suffered severe injuries. The accident happened on the first anniversary of the child's birth. It fell upon a pile of rocks, but fortunately no bones were broken, and it is believed the little one will recover.

White Rock, S. D.—A fire of unknown origin destroyed five business places and buildings here early Wednesday. The total loss was \$40,000.
