

# DANCE FOR CHARITY

Annual Ball of Jewish Women  
at the Spalding Last  
Night.

## SPECTACLE WAS BRILLIANT

The Attendance Good and the  
Gowns Were Handsome  
and Elaborate.

The first annual charity ball under the auspices of the Duluth—Superior section of the National Council of Jewish women was given last evening at the Spalding. It was a success, as was attested to by the brilliant assemblage of ladies and gentlemen who contributed to make the affair the triumph that it was.

The crowd was not as large as it would have been, had the ball been given at any time other than in the mid-holiday season. Tickets were sold greatly in excess in numbers of those who attended the ball. The ladies who had it in charge say that they have realized a snug sum, over \$1,000, and they are well-satisfied, with this, their initial effort.

Coming close on the heels of the charity ball of a few weeks ago there was naturally much critical comparison. The ball last night did not suffer by it, nor were its success and brilliancy in any way dimmed. The large dining room of the Spalding hotel was filled with the guests of the evening. The dances were entered into with zest and spirit. Everything moved with perfection, thanks to the energetic and intelligent preparations of the patronesses. The music was delightful. The costumes enhanced the brilliant effect.

### On With the Dance

It was close to 9.30 when Hoare's orchestra started the grand march. Nearly 50 couples were then on the floor. There were 17 numbers on the program, and when supper was served, about 12 o'clock, only eight had been concluded. Between the dance numbers the mandolin orchestra furnished delightful music, and the novel feature was fully appreciated by those present.

It was 3 o'clock when the last strains died away. Many had departed before that, as the last cars left the Spalding at 1:30. But a number of young people, and a few old ones, too, were loth to leave while music still had charms.
