

IMPOSING WEDDING

The Ceremony Conducted According to the Picturesque Jewish Custom.

THE WORD OF GOD IS COME

Eloquent Sermon Delivered at the Cummings Avenue Church—Notes.

The marriage of Miss Sarah Oreckovsky of this city and James Orenstein of Stillwater was celebrated yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock in Maryland hall. The event has been looked forward to for some time, as the bride's family is prominent in Jewish circles. The ceremony was performed by Rabbi Mochim and took place under a large canopy of gold and green. The groom stood in the center while the bride and the parents marched around him, carrying lighted tapers to the chanting of a religious hymn, after which the marriage license was read by the rabbi.

Probably the most striking feature of the ceremony was the drinking of red wine from one glass by the bride and groom, after which the groom broke it upon the floor. The drinking of the wine is symbolical of two lives comingling as one and the breaking of the glass is for the purpose of bringing good luck to the happy couple for ever after.

Another unusual feature of the ceremony was where the groom put the ring on the bride's finger. He handed her a coin, signifying that he would provide for her throughout her life. After the ring was given the rabbi chanted a benediction and the happy couple were made one.

After the marriage the guests present sat at the bountiful feast prepared for them.

According to the Jewish custom the celebration of the wedding will last 48 hours, after which Mr. and Mrs. Orenstein will leave for the East on an extended wedding tour and will return to Stillwater, where they will reside in the future.

The costumes of the bride and bridesmaids were all worthy of especial mention. The bride wore white silk en traine, the bodice covered with pearls and diamond ornaments, with veil and orange blossoms.

Miss Anna Scheekman, the first bridesmaid, wore green silk with pearls. Miss Mary Rosenthal cream silk with roses, Miss Ida Harris cream silk, pearls and flowers, Miss Jennie Orenstein cream silk, pearls and flowers.

Misses Anna Sipkins and Jennie Borenstein, two children, were the flower girls and looked charming in white silk.
