An Ordinance establishing a City Pound and a Pound District in the City of Virginia, and regulating the running at large of certain animals within said District and the impounding and disposing of same.

nance entitled "An Ordinance Relating to Dogs and the Licensing Thereof.'

Censing Thereof."
The common council of the City of Virginia do ordain:
Section I. That section one (1) of ordinance number three (3) being an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Relating to Dogs and the Licensing Thereof," be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following, namely: "And any dog found running at large, contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, is hereby declared to be a nuisance and shall be dealt with and disposed of as in this ordinance provided."

Section 2. That section four (4) of said ordinance be and the same is hereby amended by inserting before the word "police" where the same first occurs in said section, to-wit: "and if he shall neglect so to do, then said police officer may kill said dog".

Section 3. That section eight (8) of said ordinance is hereby amended by striking out the last clause of said section, to-wit: "and if he shall neglect so to do, then said police officer may kill said dog".

Section 3. That section eight (8) of said ordinance is hereby amended by striking out all thereof and inserting in lieu thereof the following, namely: Section 8. It shall be the duty of the poundmaster of said city to impound any and all dogs running at large in said city. contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, in the city pound, from whence said dog may be released by the owner or person claiming it, only on the payment to the poundmaster of the actual expenses of the taking and keeping said dog and a poundage fee of One Dollar.

certificate, containing a description of the dog sold, the amount of the expenses and fees paid for such dog, and the name of the person to whom said dog was sold.

Section II. Any person who violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or who shall harbor or keep any unlicensed or unregistered dog, contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance, or shall refuse or neglect to muzzle or kill any vicious or treacherous dog as herein provided, shall be subject to arrest, and upon conviction shall be fined in a sum not to exceed Fifty (%50.00) Dollars, and in default of the payment thereof, be imprisoned in the City lock-up, or county jail of St Louis county, until such fine shall be paid, not to exceed Thirty (%0) days.

Section 12. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its adoption and publication.
