

FOR A NEW FACTORY

Negotiations Pending for a
Plant to Utilize Short
Lumber.

MILL OWNERS INTERESTED

Deal Dependent on Report
From Similar Factory in
Michigan.

If plans which are now under consideration are carried out, West Duluth will shortly have a factory which will work up into serviceable articles much of the short stuff about the saw mills here, which at present goes to waste or is burned. Within the past week the owner of a factory in Whitehall, Mich., like the one proposed, has been in the city negotiating for one of the planing mills which are at present idle. He has succeeded in interesting several mill owners and propositions have been made, the acceptance of which is dependent on a favorable report of the Whitehall plant. As the mills of West Duluth annually waste many thousands of feet of lumber which can be profitably worked up, it is to be hoped that the deal will be consummated.
