The Duluth lumber talleymen are about to organize a union that affiliate with the trade's council of this city. There are about ten prospective members. The union shortly will be organized by the election of officers. The union will organize under the International Longshoremen's association.

THE WHEAT MOVEMENT.

Receipts of wheat here last week were 2,522,127 bushels and shipments were 2,522,356 bushels. The flour mills took 490,028 bushels of the total amount received, making a net decrease in elevator stock for the week of 28,475 bushels and leaving 5,194,678 bushels in store. The car inspection here yesterday was 932 of which 612 was wheat.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS.

The United States civil service commission has ordered that an examination be held in this city December 5 for the grades of clerk and carrier in the postal service. The applications for clerk must be 18 years or over, and the carrier 21 or under 40. Applications must be filed before the close of business November 21.

IN POLICE COURT.

In the police court yesterday eleven drunks and one street beggar was the round up for Saturday and Sunday and six of them went up the hill and the rest got off on suspended sentences.

The crazy man, Frank Brown who was arrested by Detective Troyer on Saturday, was charged with larceny of two dollars and he will have his hearing Wednesday next.

TAKEN TO MINNEAPOLIS.

The two colored men arrested on Friday by Detective Troyer charged with burglary at West Superior had their examination over there yesterday and were taken back to Minneapolis yesterday by Detectives Hoy and Lawrence of that city. A cold wave is expected to arrive in Duluth from the north at any minute in consequence. LUMBER CARGO RECORD.

The schooner Vinland, consort of the Viking, broke the lumber cargo record out of Duluth yesterday by carrying a cargo of 1,308,000 feet. She broke the record by 9,000 feet and the performance all the more is creditable as the cargo was bound for Tonawanda and she therefore could not take advantage of the deeper water available in the new cut at Sailor's encampment. The Vinland is a new boat just out this season and Capt. Harry Richardson of Buffalo is the managing owner.

SUITS IN FORECLOSURE.

Complaint was filed yesterday in district court in a suit brought by Jacob Fawcett against Mary P. Foster et al. The suit is brought to recover on two notes of \$1,500 and \$500.

It is alleged that Mary P. Foster in order to secure the notes gave a mortgage on lot 285 Lake avenue, Upper Duluth, and to secure the second note gave a mortgage on lot 50 Lake avenue, Lower Duluth; lot 9, block 156, Portland and the undivided half of lot 100, St. Louis avenue, Upper Duluth. It is asked that judgment be given for \$1,500 and \$43.86 respectively and that the property be ordered sold to pay the obligations.

In the confusion that ensued his assailant got away, but he was arrested on a warrant yesterday afternoon and will have to answer to a charge of assault this morning.

ISAAC SUMMERFIELD ASSIGNS.

Isaac Summerfield of Hibbing yesterday made an assignment of his business and merchandise at that place to Nathan L. Summerfield of this city. The insolvent files an affidavit that the assets are not in excess of \$8,000, and the assignee has given a bond in the sum of \$12,000.

Oscar Hjelt and John Ohmer have made an assignment to C. A. Johnson. The assigners are grocers doing business at Sixty-third avenue, near Raleigh.

A schedule of the debts of Betsey Liden, insolvent, was filed yesterday, amounting to \$637.09. The assets are scheduled at \$670.

The assignee of Frederick Meng has given notice of an application for discharge from his duties to be made November 14.
