

COOK FOUND GUILTY.

Moses Convicted of the Larceny of Ninety Posters.

In the police court yesterday Oliver Olson was sent up for 10 days and Alfred Paul was released with a suspended sentence.

The case of Moses Cook, charged with petit larceny was tried at the afternoon session. This was a very peculiar case. William Abrahamson, the clothing man, sent Cook around to Seipel's printing office to get figures and samples of some advertising bills. Loeb Brothers, another clothing house on the opposite side of Superior street, were indulging in an assignment sale and they had just had a big batch of hanging bills struck off by Seipel. Seipel told Cook to take one of the bills as a sample to show Abrahamson and Cook is alleged to have taken about ninety. Whether he did or did not take the bundle the fact remained that numbers of the same bills were displayed in Abrahamson's windows, much to the grief and indignation of Loeb Brothers who, figuratively speaking, proceeded to walk all over Gus Seipel. Mr. Seipel went to Abrahamson's, and as he alleges, got no satisfaction.

Moses Cook's arrest followed and a replevin suit was instituted and the bills were seized by Court Officer Jensen. The court found Cook guilty of petit larceny but did not pass sentence. A motion for arrest of judgment being made by Attorney Silliman for the defense.
