## GOES TO FERGUS FALLS.

Franziska Jacoblak, a Polish woman whose home is in Gnesen, was examined yesterday before Court Commissioner McAdam and was declared insane. She was taken yesterday afternoon to the Fergus Falls asylum.

## RAILWAY DENIES RESPONSIBILITY.

The Duluth & Iron Range Railway company has filed its answer to the complaint of John Schellin, a former employe that fell from the dock at Two Harbors and has sued for the recovery of damages to the amount of \$25,000. The answer recites that the accident was due to the carelessness of the plaintiff Schellin and his co-laborers.

## SIMON CLARK & CO.'S ESTATE.

Robert F. Fitzgerald, as assignee of Simon Clark & Co., has filed a statement of his receipts and disbursements in the district court. The monies coming into his hands amounted to \$21,508 while his expenditures were \$18,275. The assignee's bill for services is \$2,000 while the balance claimed to be due William A. Cant, as attorney's fees, is \$36.

## TO CLEAR TITLE.

Title to the southeast quarter of section 2, 50-14 is involved in a suit filed yesterday in the district court by W. W. Billson against Oliver and Elizabeth Bourcier and Charles H. Bennett. Plaintiff alleges that he is the owner in fee of the property and that the defendants wrongfully claim title. He asks judgment that the defendants or anyone claiming through or under them be declared to have no right, title or interest in the land.

## TRUST DEED OF THE CHANDLER.

A trust deed was given by Henry M. and Mary E. Bradley of Duluth to Andrew W. Comstock of Alpena, Mich., was filed yesterday in the office of the register of deeds. The property conveyed in trust is the land in 62-12, one of the forties on which is situated the Chandler mine. The object of the trust is to secure the payment of 80 bonds of \$50 each issued by the Bradleys. Bonds to the amount of \$20,000 are still outstanding secured by the same property.

## LOOK OVER THE TRUNK ROAD.

County Auditor Halden, Surveyor Fred Davis and J. C. Helm of the board of county commissioners have been out on a trip of inspection looking over a portion of the construction work on the Miller trunk road. They were at Gulbranson Bros.' camp in the town of Industrial. Mr. Halden states that the section of the road—five miles—which these contractors are constructing is about two-thirds completed, and that the work done upon it has been excellent.

"When those roads are completed," said Mr. Halden yesterday, "St. Louis county will have as good thoroughfares as any county in the state—as good as any county could have."

## CITY CIVIL COURT.

At the regular term of the municipal court before Judge Edson the case of Mary Devine vs. the city for injuries received from the overturning of a buggy allegedly caused by an obstruction upon Second street near First avenue east, occupied the whole day and was not con-

cluded when the court adjourned. The amount sued for is \$500.

## NEW SAWMILL BUILDING.

The work of putting in the foundation for the new sawmill which will be built by Stevens & Gray near the site of the old Gray mill which was burned last summer, is progressing rapidly. The stack of the old mill is being taken down and if found to be in as good condition as it is supposed to be, it will be used for the new mill. The work of taking down the Knox mill at Knox Mills, Wis., for removal here is now in progress and will be erected on the foundation which is now being prepared for it within 60 days.

## RECEPTION TO DR. RINGLAND.

Rev. Dr. Ringland, former pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will arrive in the city tomorrow to spend a week here. The opportunity has been taken advantage of by the members of the Young Men's league of the church to tender their former pastor a reception in the Sunday school parlors on Friday evening. Many members of the league are earnest friends of the doctor and it is probable that many will turn out to meet him. Dr. Ringland will probably preach at the church next Sunday. Dr. Cleland is ill with a severe cold, and was able to preach only once last Sunday.

## Y. M. C. A. ELECTION.

The board of directors of the Young Men's Christian association met last night and elected officers for the ensuing year. Ten directors were elected last week and

the following officers were elected last night: Benjamin E. Wells, president; W. S. Woodbridge, vice president; C. Powell Grady, secretary; C. F. How, treasurer.

C. H. Moorman was elected general secretary and authorized to confer with the state committee with reference to securing a physical director at once. He goes to Minneapolis today for this purpose.

## CEMETERY SITE CHOSEN.

Dinham and County Surveyor Fred Davis went out to the poor farm yesterday and located a site for the new cemetery and for the mortuary vault which Evans & Grandy are to erect. The cemetery will contain five acres. The site selected is south from the poor house.

An officer on Garfield avenue pulled the box, thinking that the blaze was on the Duluth side. The fire was in the East end fire hall at Old Superior.

## DEATH OF J. S. LOEB.

Joseph S. Loeb, brother of Louis Loeb, died yesterday at St. Luke's hospital of pneumonia. The remains were taken to Stewart's morgue and will be sent to Legioner, Ind., for interment.

The death of Archibald Campbell, of 1125 West Michigan street, in his 75th year, occurred yesterday. The funeral will take place tomorrow from the Cathedral.

## THE SAUNDERS BENEFIT.

## BRUSH IN CHARGE.

C. H. Brush, the national bank examiner, arrived yesterday noon from Fergus Falls and took charge of the affairs of the National Bank of Commerce. Mr. Brush says he has nothing to say at present concerning the bank. As to the appointment of a receiver he did not know yet whether one would be appointed or not as there were many similar cases where a receiver was not applied for.

## WILL BE SETTLED TONIGHT.

A general meeting of the depositors of the Security bank will be held this evening at the old postoffice location on Fourth avenue west and it is expected something definite will result in regard to the plan

of reorganization. The committee of which M. M. Gasser is chairman will make a report of the progress which has been made since the last meeting. Mr. Gasser says nothing definite can be known as to the probable outcome in advance of the meeting tonight.

## TREASURER KOERNER HERE.

State Treasurer August T. Koerner was in the city all day yesterday looking after the interest of the state in the suspension of the National Bank of Commerce. The state has \$7,500 in the institution and after an investigation Mr. Koerner is satisfied that every dollar will be paid in full and quite speedily. In regard to that check on the Marine bank which he failed to get cashed before the institution closed its doors and which he sent back to County Treasurer Whipple to be applied on the school fund, Mr. Koerner said he had nothing to say as the matter would probably be adjusted in the courts.

## AN INSANE OPERATOR.

Thomas Costello, an operator formerly employed at Endion, was found at about 7 o'clock last night wandering along the lake shore in the East End and shouting at the top of his voice. He said that he was holding converse with the spirit of his departed brother. The patrol wagon was sent for and the man was taken to the county jail for safe keeping. It is thought that his aberration is temporary and that he will be all right in a day or two. Costello has lost one of his legs and walks on crutches.
