

POLICE COURT NOTES.

Martin Knox an aborigine who is in Duluth as a witness in a federal court case celebrated his advent into the big city by taking on a heavy load of fire-water and indulging in a war dance down near the Bethel. All this took place early yesterday morning and later in the day Martin was lead before Judge Boyle on a drunk charge. He was a very tame looking Indian and pleaded hard for leniency but without avail. Martin will spend the next 10 days in the bastille working out a \$10 sentence.

After disposing of the red man the court turned its attention to the rest of the grist. Herman Berg, P. Lefan and Harry Johnson sadly owned up to vagrancy and for their frankness received suspended sentences. Albert Peterson and Henry Hunt were sent to join Knox on the hill on charges of drunkenness. Martin Hurley was given 10 days for assaulting his wife.

Before Judge Edson the trial of the second of the jury cases, of assault against Isaac Polinsky was in progress all the afternoon and was not concluded at the adjournment. The complainant is Morris Greenfield. Polinsky was convicted Wednesday of having assaulted Mrs. Samuel Goldstein and after a decision is reached in the Greenfield case there are still two more cases to be heard by the court.
