## Resigns Golden Star.

Wilbur J. Merritt has resigned his position as superintendent of the Golden Star mine, near Mine Center, and will engage in other business. Mr. Kerr, an expert deep miner, formerly with Frazer & Chalmers, is now in charge of the property.

The Golden Star mine is the property of the Golden Star Mining & Exploration company, and is one of the most promising properties in the district. A new 20-stamp mill is in course of construction, and will be started by Sept. 20, and will be adjusted and ready to grind Oct. 7.

There are about 1,000 feet of drifts and shafts, and there are between 5,000 and 6,000 tons of rock in stockpile. The shaft is large and roomy, and the entire equipment is up-to-date. About 115 men are employed in and about the mine.
