

Duluth: Socially

The concert given by the High School Musical society on Friday evening may be taken as evidence of the musical work that is being carried on in the high school. In the first place, music is an entirely voluntary study, and only two periods a day are given up to it. In spite of these facts 147 pupils attend the classes. The general idea of the training is to put into actual practical working the slight reading and grammatical work pursued in the grade schools. The Musical society, with a membership of 129, gives the concerts and other entertainments, and is in close touch with the work done in the regular music classes. That the training received by the pupils is valuable and correct was evidenced by the rendition of the various ensemble numbers on Friday evening. The chorus was admirable in time, tone, attack, distinct enunciation, and shading. The balance of the voices, though, was somewhat uneven, owing to a lack of sufficient bass and tenor, a general fault in school choruses. However, those young men who did take part gave a good account of themselves. The soloists of the evening were very pleasing. Miss Rena Smith's voice is developing very rapidly under careful training, and bids fair to rank very highly. Mrs. Mark Baldwin who made her debut before a Duluth audience, possesses a very sweet and sympathetic mezzo-soprano, and sings in good style, though her voice is hardly strong enough for so large a hall. Miss Clara Hector's rendering of Tosti's "Yesterday" surprised and pleased everyone. It is seldom that a young singer develops as rapidly and as satisfactorily as she has done of late, while the effect of her singing is enhanced by her easy and unaffected manner. Miss Susanne McKay's pure soprano was heard to great advantage in "Barbara Frische" (a favorite, by the way of the great Nordica), and she was well supported by the chorus. The immense audience of more than 1500 people showed by their frequent and sincere applause their evident enjoyment of the whole program.
